

I Want to Squeeze Your Hand

Sonote wo nigiritai / その手をにぎりたい

From the bestselling author of *Butter*—a woman's decade-long love affair with sushi, and the chef who serves it

Asako Yuzuki, author of the international bestseller Butter, delivers a story set during Japan's bubble economy (1980-1992). The bubble was a period of abnormally high land prices, the most prosperous time in Japanese history—it's often said that people were dancing and waving money around.

Twenty-five-year-old Seiko decides to quit her job and go back to her hometown, but her life changes at the high-class sushi restaurant in Ginza where her boss takes her for a farewell dinner. There, following unconventional etiquette, diners receive each piece of sushi directly from the chef's hand to theirs, and Seiko is attracted by both chef Ichinose and his skills. Determined to earn enough money to frequent the restaurant, Seiko aborts her plan to go home, joins a real estate company, and gives herself over to the bubble economy.

A decade is covered in one chapter per year. At first, Seiko feels small at the high-class establishment, but over time she transforms into a sophisticated regular; however, her feelings for Ichinose are unreciprocated, and once the bubble bursts, issues appear at work and in her patronage of the sushi spot. After ten years of a relationship in which the pair only touch the moment the sushi changes hands, their story reaches a calm, beautiful conclusion. Yuzuki envisions this book as a Japan and woman–centered The Great Gatsby. It's a raw depiction of the ups and downs of an era seen through a woman's passion for sushi and a chef. How about some sushi after *Butter*?

Born in 1981. Japanese novelist. Won the All Yomimono Award for New Writers in 2008 and debuted in 2010 with *Shūten no ano ko* (The girl at the end of the line). In 2015, she won the Yamamoto Shugoro Award Hooked (English forthcoming tr. Polly Barton). Her most famous work, *Butter* (2017), has been licensed in 35 countries. Polly Barton's English translation has sold over 400,000 copies in the U.K. and over 100,000 in the U.S., and Yuzuki became the first Japanese author to win the prestigious British Book Award.

A late night bite at Fuku-Fuku Books

Fuku-fuku shobo de oyashoku wo /ふくふく書房でお夜食を

A cozy bookshop by day, a secret restaurant by night—heartwarming tales of literature, comfort food, and second chances

In one corner of Tokyo on the back side of an old shopping arcade is a little bookstore called Floofy Books. This shop run by former cook Natsuro, his daughter Naru, poster dog Fukuko, and poster cat Daifuku transforms at night. After the bookstore closes, a warm lamp goes on outside—that's the sign that their secret restaurant is open. The visitors to this "little nighttime rest station" are exhausted by life. A woman betrayed by her fiancé, a mother feeling lonely as her daughter prepares to move out—people with various worries come to this curious space in search of healing.


The food Natsuro and Naru cook are inspired by literary masterpieces, from Japanese classics such as *Botchan* and *Night* on the *Galactic Railroad* to Western titles such as *Anne of Green Gables* and *Little House on the Prairie*: tempura soba, hitsumabushi, shepherd's pie, cookies from scratch—all imbued with the spirit of literature.

On the upper floors are bathing facilities and overnight accommodations. With that plus the interaction with animals, what more could a person want from a healing space?

Amemichi Sunagawa's depictions of the food are a highlight, and the lightly crunchy tempura, fragrant soba, and rich, buttery cookies appeal to the reader's senses. These are stories of hope and rebirth told through the intertwined warmth of books and food, humans and animals. This moving book will sooth stinging hearts through the powers of literature and good food and offer courage for tomorrow.

A former weekly magazine reporter goes after her old classmate Michiru, who is suspected of involvement in a case of skeletal remains discovered in the mountains. Utilizing her tenacious reporting skills, she sees how once-thriving Michiru met a man and fell so far as to be the perpetrator of a terrible crime.


Though alluring at first, as time goes on, the man began abusing her. The violence of this man, who was tortured as a child, became a daily occurrence, and the process of her fearfully accepting the relationship forces the reader to vicariously experience the psychology of a domestic violence victim. Eventually, Michiru begins taking care of an elderly woman with dementia as an accomplice in the crime of defrauding her.

The women loves Michiru as if she were her real little sister, but when her physical condition deteriorates, the man refuses treatment for her, and she dies. After burying the body in the mountains, Michiru finally cracks under the pressure, stabs the man, and flees. Ultimately, the police arrest her, and she is able to escape her private hell.

This book comes together as a breath-taking thriller, a crime novel where the protagonist's reporting know-how gradually unravels the case, as well as a human drama depicting the ruin of a person in search of love against the backdrop of issues plaguing contemporary society such as child abuse, domestic violence, and codependence. Despite so much despair, the author's sympathetic gaze allows readers to find a glimmer of hope at the end.

Japan Booksellers' Award winner Sonoko Machida explores the community's crucial role in addressing maternal ambivalence in contemporary Japan

Sora, from the Japanese word for "air," has two mothers, a birth mum and the mother who lovingly raised her until she had to move to Singapore due to her husband's job transfer. Before starting elementary school, Sora could not believe her luck at having two mothers. She did not live with Kano, her birth mum, but they met regularly and she was immensely proud of her beautiful looks, sweet disposition, and talent as an illustrator. However, when the mother who raised her moves abroad and Sora is forced to live with Kano, the situation drastically changes. When it comes to her work, Kano is considered a distinguished illustrator, but she has none of the qualities usually associated with a "normal mother." She is not particularly good at cooking and lacks the confidence and special attention needed to raise a child.

In dire need of help through the chaos of newfound motherhood, Kano decides to rely on old friend Saeki, a chef at a local restaurant. She asks Saeki to cook daily meals for Sora and keep an eye on her. From Saeki Sora learns not only how to cook, but also how pouring all her heart into the making of a dish has the power to heal people's souls. A touching story depicting the rebirth of a dysfunctional family through food.

Record of an Instinct

Seishokuki / 生殖記

Ryo Asai

A bold, genre-defying novel narrated by a reproductive instinct 100,000 copies sold in Japan and nominated for the 2025 Japan Booksellers' Award

Shosei is a 33-year-old man who works in the general affairs department of a consumer electronics manufacturer. He is gay and in the closet. Ever since childhood he's never managed to have feelings for the opposite sex and has no experience dating girls, but neither has he had a gay lover, and he hasn't come out to his family, either. For this reason, he tries to keep his social life minimal, pretending to be a member of the collective while only participating in a passive way.

What makes this book so special is that the narrator isn't Shosei, but the reproductive instinct inhabiting his penis. The reproductive instinct being has previously worked on all sorts of other species and was even in charge of a human female at one time.

This outsider view of human society raises fundamental issues with the "common" sense about community and interpersonal relationships that many people accept unconsciously. Why do humans pursue the development and growth of their collective? How do individuals make their respective contributions to that development and growth? And what are homosexual people to that collective? The perspective of Shosei, gay and human, combines with the more objective observations of the reproductive instinct narrator to produce a reading experience like no other.

Even if I steal and eat and purge

Nusunde tabete haite mo / 盗んで食べて吐いても

A mother's cruel words become a daughter's lifelong addiction—a gripping novel of compulsion and survival

"If you get fat, you're not allowed to eat." Saori, a company employee in her 40s, has been cursed since growing up hearing those words form her mother. The mental wound of being denied food by a mother who prioritized body shape above all came to the surface during her middle school days as theft and continues quietly even after her marriage. While she appears to live an average working-mother life, she stops at the supermarket on her way home to shoplift, binge-eats upon arriving, and vomits everything up in the toilet.

This destructive steal-binge-purge cycle gives her a warped sense of liberation, but her double-life comes crashing down when, disturbed after receiving a phone call that her mother is in critical condition, she finally gets arrested shoplifting. Having lost the trust of her family, she knows things can't go on like this, but she can't stop stealing. Even after she's indicted and sentenced to prison time, she's like a runaway train.

Mina Sakurai depicts the stormy life of a woman who can't escape her mother's chains even after becoming a mother herself. Readers witness the horrors of an addiction that remains stubborn even in prison and the despair at herself Saori feels as she continuously betrays the people most precious to her. Through the anguish of a woman whose utterly natural desire to be accepted by her mother went unfulfilled and reasserted itself in a twisted way, this novel depicts the realities of addiction and a path to hope.



The Amari End-of-life Photo Studio standing quietly on a back alley in Sugamo is a special photo studio for taking the last portrait of a person's life. Specializing in memorial photos, they also provide support for every aspect of end-of-life planning from counseling to inquiries about wills and funerals. Clients with various circumstances come for help from the diverse staff members: Ametoshi, the blunt photographer; end-of-life coordinator Yumeko, who is in it for the money; assistant Dotonbori, who doesn't speak the dialect anyone expects given his hometown; and the former beautician, Hana.

A grandmother's mysterious will, twelve years of strife between father and son, the emotion behind a photograph of a pregnant woman stored at the studio, a complicated photograph request from a terminal cancer patient—this human drama is made up of these four stories and manages to be heartwarming while confronting death. You Ashizawa, a Mystery Writers of Japan Award-winner, changes up her style to deliver this collection of connected mysteries of hope and rebirth. Fusing mystery-solving and profound depictions of humanity, the book investigates family ties and the meaning of life through the end of Japan's end-of-life planning culture. What kind of picture would you want to take if you knew it were your last?



The result was the discovery that cinerous tits have words that can be combined to create over 200 sentences. They even use their wings to make gestures. Particularly groundbreaking was his demonstration that the birds possess the abstract concept of "snake."

In 2022, Suzuki received a huge round of applause when he declared he was establishing the field of animal linguistics at the International Society for Behavioral Ecology Congress. In 2025, he is receiving the prestigious Tinbergen Lecturer Award in the UK. He established the world's first animal linguistics lab at Tokyo University. This book is not a difficult science text but an easy-to-read essay with witty narration and charming illustrations. It became an immediate bestseller in Japan with over 150,000 copies in print. This is the story of a modern-day Doctor Doolittle that overturns our human-centric worldview.

In this fourth installment of the endearingly surreal *Sato the Rabbit* series, Yuki Ainoya explores the theme of light, how it can be manipulated as a physical object and used in ways we would never have thought of. In the first half of the book, entitled *Asahi* (Morning Sun), Sato grabs the slit of morning sunlight peeking through the curtains of his room and uses it as a tool for various purposes. He stirs with it his coffee, scoops up sparkles from the river, lights a fire with it, cooks and eventually eats it. By the time the slit of sunlight is all gone, night has fallen and it is dark again. In the second and last story of the book, entitled *Todai* (Lighthouse), Sato's room turns into a lighthouse quietly floating in the sea. The sound of the waves, curiously shaped clouds and an enchanting sunset are only some of the wonders Sato discovers inside the seashells he finds on his way.
